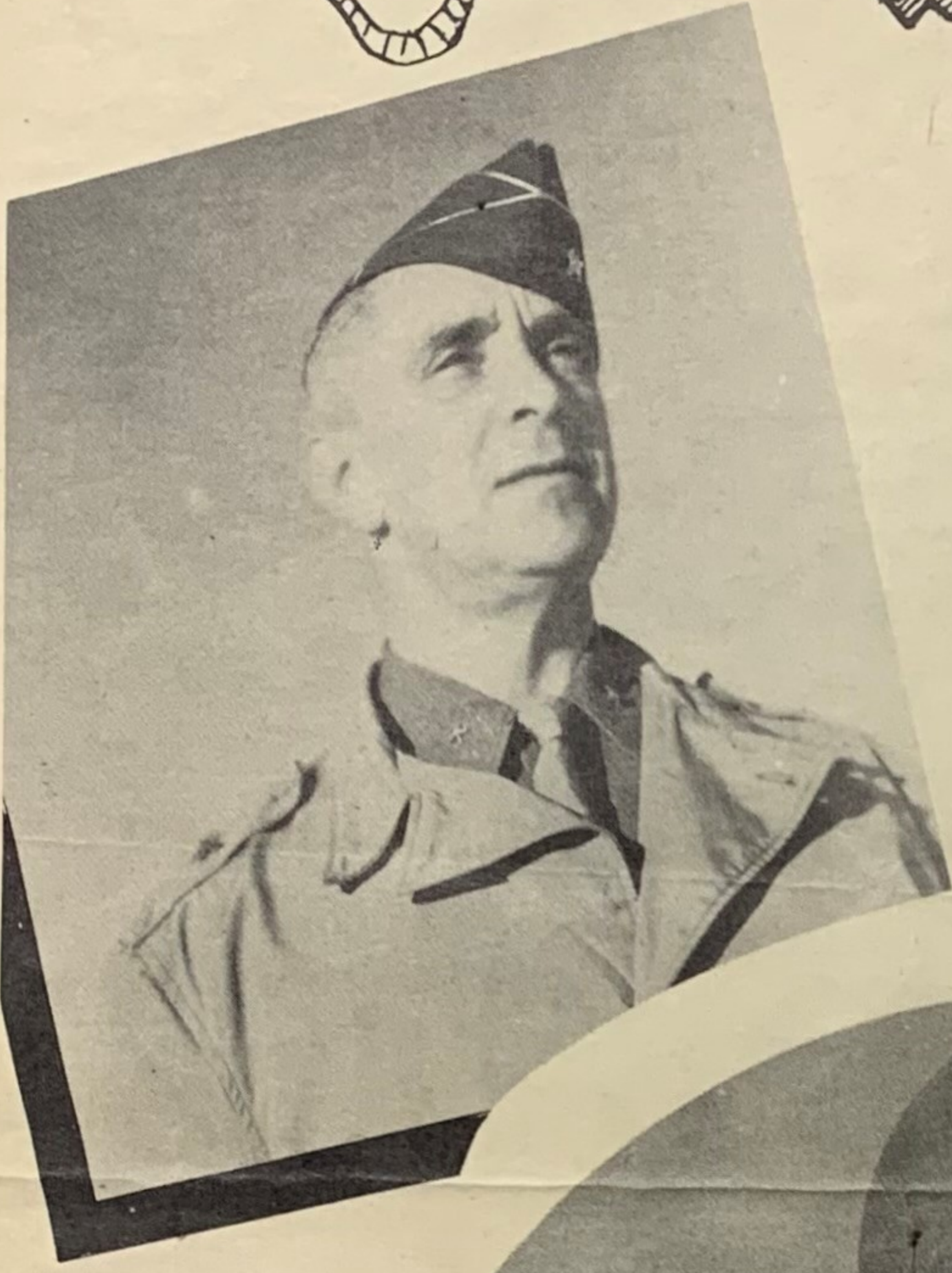

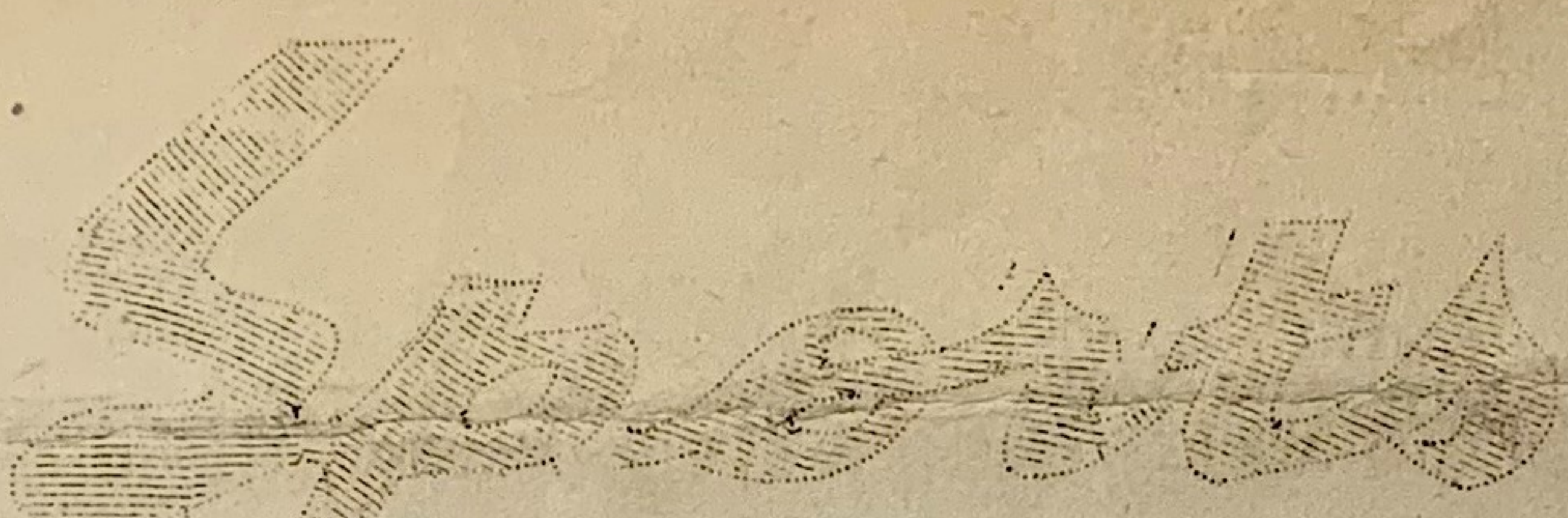

ARTILLERY EMERGE VICTORIOUS

Winning their first cage encounter in their past five starts was the 36th Division Artillery hoopsters. This victory rung up at the expense of the revived 143rd Infantry basketeers.
