Four Div. bands will clash in a "Battle of Bands" Monday night in the Arena at 143d Infantries, & Div. Artillery.


Each band will play three selections under the classifications: a. March, enabling a true comparison; b. Concert or Movelty Number, skill in interpretation; & c.




