The Akron (O.) lad would climb up the fire ladder the several times a day, straighten out the flag which usually was twisted around the pole.

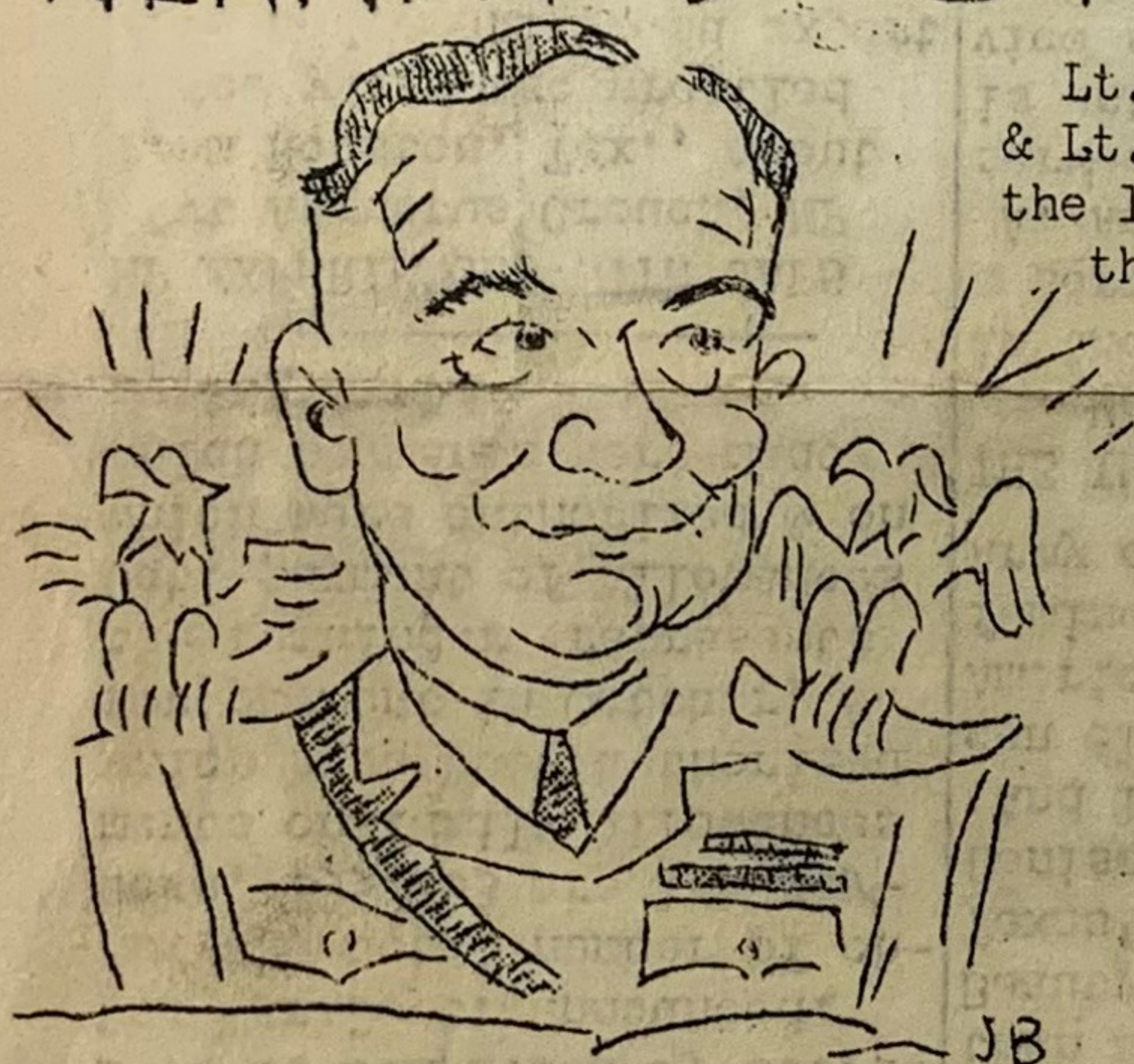

STEEN WERNER DON EAGLES



Lt. Col. Marvin D. Steen, Division Adjutant General, & Lt. Col. Richard J. Werner, commanding officer of the 141st Infantry, recently received promotions to the rank of full colonel.

Colonel Werner, designer of the 141st insignia, was assigned to the regiment from the Div. G-3 office in early September. A San Antonian, he formerly commanded 141st's B & F companies.

Colonel Steen, formerly operations officer, of the 141st Inf., served 11 months in France during World War I, but had a total of war service of 2 years & 4 months. He also had service on the Mexican border and was division Adjutant General at mobilization in Nov., 1940.

Also promoted was Maj. Robert M. Ives, G-1, to Lt. Col. after service with the division's General Staff almost since mobilization. He had seven months of combat service in World

War I. Lt. Col. Ives of Palestine, Texas, studied at Columbia & Princeton universities. Other promotions included the advance of Capt. Francis R. Reese, G-2 ass't, to Major; Lt. Jimmie Lane, Special Service assistant, to Captain, & Lt. Richie Davis, Div. Chaplain ass't, to Captain.

Major Reese of Houston, Texas, a graduate of Okla. U. is attending the Command & General Staff School at present.

Both Capt. Lane & Capt. Davis hail from Ft. Worth where the first was on the editorial staff of the Press. Chaplain Davis, a graduate of Texas Christian University, is a protestant minister. Capt. Lane formerly served in the field artillery.

Division preliminaries to a camp Golden Gloves contest will be held at 7:30 o'clock Thursday night in the Arena with pugilists in eight classes flashing their "dukes."

PASS CARDS PRESCRIBED

Class A and B pass cards will be provided for all enlisted personnel of the division in accord with a new camp order that passes and identification tags be shown at the gate before leaving and entering.

Standard mimeographed forms will be used and will exclude mention of the man's organization.

Also announced was an authorization for wearing of the woolen O.D. shirt or the field jacket on pass as an outer garment only within a 15-miles radius of camp.

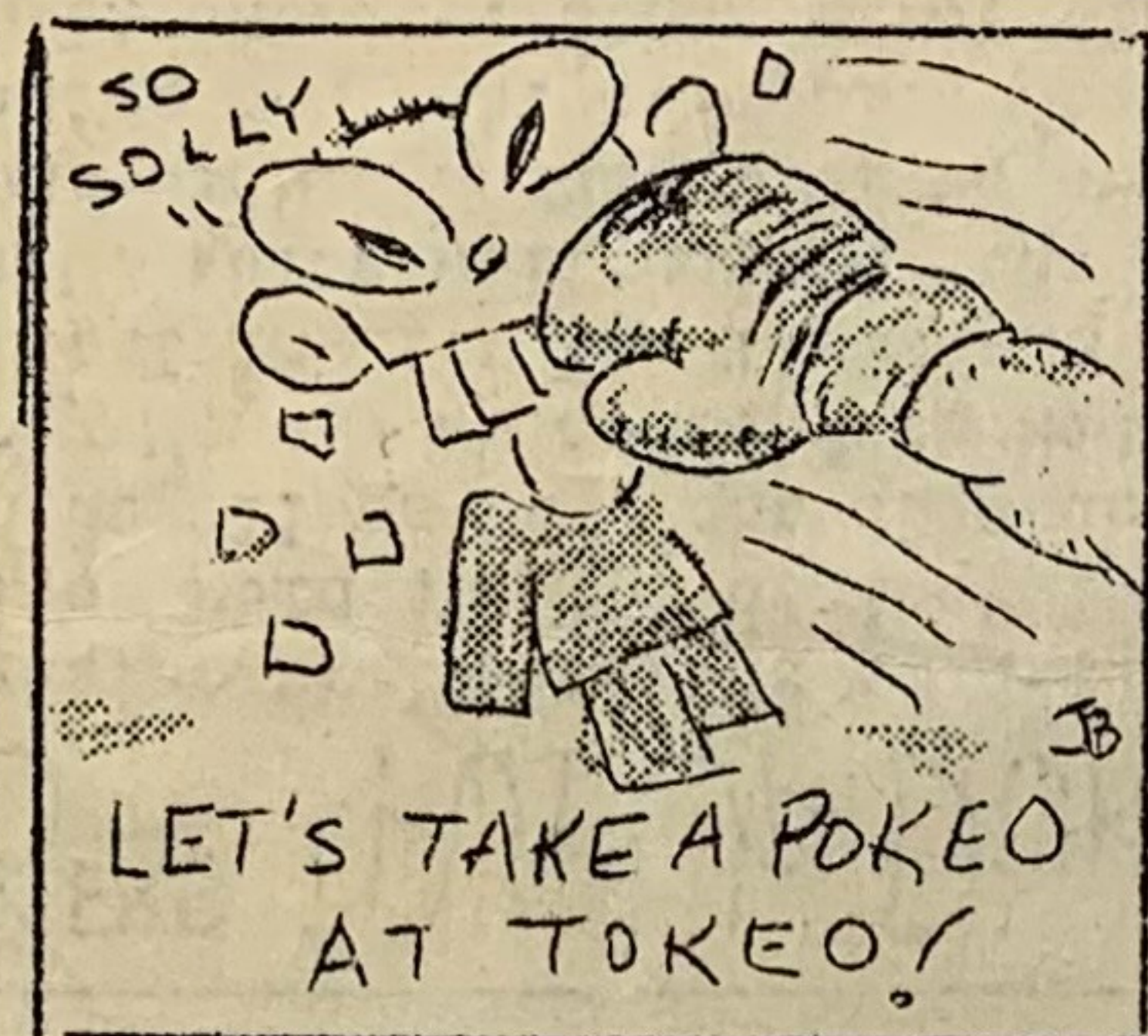
DEPENDENTS CHECKS MAILED

Mailing of approximately 270,000 checks totalling \$19,500,000 in family allowance payments to eligible relatives & dependents of soldiers was started Oct. 1 to be completed by Oct. 10 the War Dept. announced.

Of the total number of checks, 135,363 are 1st payments on family allowances which have been authorized for payment in October, & the remainder represents Oct. payment of allowances which were authorized & on which payments were made during Sept.

A. An enlisted man who has served honorably three years is entitled to wear the service stripe. This is worn 4 inches from the end of the left sleeve of the service coat. For each additional 3 years, another is worn.
